FOX RIVER FLOODING: RESIDENTS ADVISED TO SEEK ALTERNATIVE SHELTER if THEIR HOME IS AFFECTED BY FLOODING

The National Weather Service (NWS) in Sullivan WI has predicted that the Fox River will rise from its current flood stage of 11.92 Feet (3:30 PM on January 9) and is currently predicted to crest at 12.5 Feet early on Thursday afternoon, January 10th. The river should fall below flood stage (10 feet) late Tuesday January 15th. The Fox River Height/flow is measured at the New Munster River Gauge.

In the Oakwood Shores Subdivision in the Town of Wheatland, water is on some of the streets at 11.2 feet. At approximately 12.5 feet, water starts entering some of the low lying homes in the Oakwood Shores Subdivision.

“Residents are urged to take extreme caution and seek alternative shelter if their home is affected by flooding or they are unable to get into their home until the river subsides,” stated Ben Schliesman, Director, Kenosha County Emergency Management/ Homeland Security. “When the flood waters get this high, swift currents may be present which will pose an extreme danger to residents and any First Responders whom may have to assist if an emergency arises. Residents who choose to remain in flooded areas, do so at their own risk.”

“We constantly monitor the Fox River and other areas of the County where flooding occurs or might occur,” said Schliesman. “Water can be extremely dangerous. It takes only two feet of water covering a roadway to carry away most automobiles. It’s critical that people be aware of their surroundings when water is present and that they don’t drive through flooded areas or try and stay in an area and wait out the flood; they may be putting their lives and their loved ones lives in serious peril. A NOAA All Hazard Weather Radio with the frequency of 162.450 is a must for residents, businesses and public buildings so as to stay on top of weather and non weather emergencies.”

NOTE: The Fox River flows through the Towns of Salem and Wheatland and the Village of Silver Lake.
